Yet another membership renewal period is beginning for the Ski Touring Section of PATC. Memberships expiring in 2006 must be renewed before 1 January 2007 for membership to continue into the upcoming ski season. The three month countdown is on! To check your membership status, examine the mailing label on your last UPSLOPE. If you see a fournumber field other than 0612 (0712, 0812 etc) your dues have been paid up and there is no need for you to renew at this time. Whitegrass Work Trip, WV—November 10-12: Contact Lynn Yates—Help Chip maintain your favorite trails at Whitegrass. Always a great time. Rustic accommodations: we may be sleeping in tents or in the Whitegrass Café.

Tug Hill Upstate NY New Year's Ski Mini Week—Dec 28, 2006 - Jan 1, 2007: Contact Steve Brickel or Peggy Alpert—Celebrate the holidays staying at the historic 1880 House in Pulaski, NY facing the Salmon River (close to Lake Ontario) Enjoy the expected heavy lake effect snowfall prevalent in this area as we ski some of our favorites at nearby Winona State Forest and Osce-

ola STCs. Cost is \$260/person, which includes four nights of lodging, breakfasts, soup after skiing each day, and a New Year's Eve wine and cheese party plus full dinner in the B&B.

Laurel Highlands, PA—Multiple dates, see page 4. We stay at Somerset, PA in the heart of the Laurel Highlands. While we're there, we have a choice of many ski areas: Laurel Mountain, Laurel Ridge, Kooser State Park, Hidden Valley (XC and downhill), Roaring Run and others. Plenty of skiing for all levels including skate skiing. Guaranteed fun. Ski on the trails we improved in October and discover new ski trails. Check out the Laurel Ridge skicam to see how much snow they have there when we don't have any here. Contact trip leader for specific details.

Canaan Valley/Blackwater Falls, WV—Multiple dates, see page 4. Stay at the rim of the Blackwater Gorge at the Blackwater Falls State Park Lodge, complete with restaurant, fitness center, indoor pool and hot tub. Each room has two double beds. Ski out the door on over 20 miles of trails nestled among towering pines, brom beginner to advanced. Enjoy hot chocolate on the trail or at the warming hut on Sled Hill, complete with its tow rope to add to your telemarking fun. Or, try other trails from the lodge or cabins at nearby Canaan Valley State Park, Whitegrass Ski Touring Center and Dolly Sods. Evening folk music and entertainment options also just a few miles away with breakfasts at the lodge. Contact trip leader for specific trip details.

Yellowstone National Park, Montana—Feb 16-24, 2007: Contact Rob Swennes—The PATC-Ski Touring Section is planning a ski excursion to beautiful Yellowstone National Park, at the intersection of Idaho, Montana, and Wyoming. Yellowstone, the Nation's first national park, has developed an excellent cross-country skiing operation that offers extraordinary landscape beauty with a bountiful variety of wildlife and hot springs. Backcountry ski trail networks extend out miles into the park from both the Mammoth Hot Springs Hotel and the Snow Lodge near Old Faithful. As of press time, this trip is FULL! However, Rob will help other skiers coordinate travel to "shadow" the formal STS group assuming they can find available lodging.

WHERE: The Potomac Appalachian Trail Club (PATC) headquarters at 118 Park Street, Vienna, VA 22180 [directly in front of the Safeway which itself is on corner of Park & Maple Sts.(VA Rt.123) in Vienna]

Getting to the fair is easy, but depends upon your starting point! Once you find the intersection of Interstate 66 and Interstate 495 (alias the Washington Beltway), take the Nutley Street North (VA Rt. 243) exit just outside the Beltway. Go north just over 1 mile passing two traffic lights. When you get to the third light, turn right onto Route 123 (alias Maple Avenue). Continue in the right-hand lane for about ¾ mile or count traffic lights. When you reach the fourth light, turn right onto Park Street. The PATC headquarters is the second building on the left, a red brick two-story structure with parking in front. There is ample parking in the area. It is convenient to shop at the nearby SAFEWAY, then visit the Fair.

A Venture Into Nordic's "Dark Side"

If this season repeats our experience from last winter, what is a snow-starved STS'er to do? One possibility is to learn Telemark skiing!

Last winter I happened to stumble into a season-long effort to learn Telemark ("Telly") skiing. In case you don't know, the Telemark turn, that graceful-looking bent-knee skiing method, predates "modern" downhill skiing turns such as parallel and stem Christie, and has been revived in fits and starts since fixed-heel "Alpine" gear came into being during the 1950's and 60's. The vast majority of the skiing masses today use fixed-heel bindings; relatively few use free heel gear. Why learn Telemark? Why devote time to an "obsolete" skiing technique?

- You can do it at downhill resorts when natural snow is insufficient or doesn't exist. It's an alternative way to get that "snow fix" when the winter weather isn't cooperating.
- It's fun. As I transitioned into using stiffer boots and shaped backcountry skis for cross-country touring, I began to crave those opportunities for descents using the rudiments of the Telemark. It became difficult to bypass those little downhill side excursions, done for no purpose but the heck of it.
- It's athletic. Your legs feel it, and it definitely warms you up! You may not get as much exercise in a day of Telly at a downhill area as you do in a day of cross-country, but it's more than what you get than in a day of Alpine.
- It's a confidence builder. Once you learn Telly, you will never, ever fear any downhill stretch you might face (except maybe boilerplate ice or hard crust, which defeats almost anything but traverse and kick turn).
- It's a challenge. If life is ho-hum and your job is a bore, take the Telemark learning challenge. It will occupy your mind!

Think you are too old for this Telly business? After all, isn't that for twenty-something megaskiers hurtling down 50-degree chutes in the Wasatch? Poppycock. I will never see birthdays in the forties again, but I've managed. Granted, I'm in pretty fair shape and have always had good body flexibility, but I'm a bit of a klutz in the body movement coordination department and ski rather slowly (downhill, anyway) to boot. But, who cares but yourself? Late starters have the common sense of maturity and experience on their side.

Another factor that helps the modern-day Telly skier is the quality of the gear. Today's lightweight plastic boots, shaped skis, and tough cable bindings have made the technique easier to execute than ever before. That does NOT mean the turns come without effort or skill—but you don't have to carry out excruciating deep knee bends and force turns by sheer brute force as in straight-ski leather-boot days.

If you want to learn Telly, there are some facts you need to face:

- YOU MUST TAKE LESSONS. Only rare individuals can learn this skill by themselves. Though it helps to emulate your friends and other people, there are nuances that only professional instruction can guide you through.
- IT MAY TAKE TIME. Don't expect one teaching clinic to be all that's needed. You will likely need several sessions, and as much practice time as you can manage. You may pick it up quickly, but even fast learners will develop little "bad habits" that can only be wrung out with critiquing by others and practice.
- THE SPORT AIN'T FREE. Downhill area lift tickets cost a bit compared to cross-country area use fees. However, in a poor natural snow season that may be the only way to obtain the required practice time in the Middle Atlantic region. And, think about this, would you rather sit home and watch TV?
- THE GEAR IS AN INVESTMENT. Telemark gear costs some bucks. The skis, boots, and bindings aren't cheap, and will claim more
 of your coins than the Nordic stuff. But once you've begun to like the sport (and perhaps tried it out with rental or demo gear first),
 you will mind the purchase prices less.

Anyway, last year was a memorable ski season for me, even though the ski touring opportunities were rather sparse. With the aid of good instruction and the encouragement and companionship of good friends (and the forbearance of a wife and daughter whom I left behind at home waaaay too much), I expanded my personal skiing universe into the Telemark realm.

It's a wonderful world!

and down-hill for those who are so inclined, or Telemark and Radonee' for those who can, Stowe offers world-class skiing in our own back yard. Accommodations: Motel with kitchens, private baths, etc. located on main road with access to ski trails. Approximate lodging cost - \$240 (depending on number of participants) Flight info: Fly out of DC on the evening of 2/15; return evening of 2/20. Approx. cost \$325 Ground transporation will be rentals, approximate cost \$100.

New Germany, MD—Feb 16-19, 2007, President's Weekend: Contact Jack Wise—New Germany State Forest is east of Deep Creek Lake and north of Canaan Valley in western Maryland. We ski on the Park trails and stay at historic Casselman Inn, eating hearty country fare from the Mennonite kitchen.

Learn to Ski—Jan 19-21, 2007: Contact Julie Nash or Larry Doff—Camp Sequanota, Jennerstown, PA, at Laurel Highlands. Catch XC ski fever with other students and the help of volunteer instructors. We'll learn to ski at Camp Sequanota, near Laurel Mountain. When you complete the course, you should be able to ski on the many beginner trails at our favorite ski areas.

Ski-Dance Weekend—Feb 16-19, 2007: Contact Elliot Applestein—Camp Harmony, Laurel Highlands, PA, has cross country skiing (downhill skiing available nearby), sledding, dancing (contra and square dancing; workshops, too), and music making. Have lots of fun outdoors and indoors in a beautiful rustic setting. Dance to live music in the evening by Dave Weisler and the Avant Gardeners. Dances called by Robin Schaffner & Bob Mathis. Bring your talents and instruments to share. Lodging is dormitory-style at Camp Harmony; that is, group rooms in heated cabins. Check out the website, http://www.skidance.com, for more information and a registration form. The weekend will NOT be cancelled for lack of snow.

Garnet Hill Lodge, NY—Feb 23-26, 2007: Contact Al Larsen—Garnet Hill Lodge is a true Adirondack mountain resort on 13th Lake. Enjoy miles of scenic groomed trails. Take a ski lesson. Watch your kids ski. Enjoy a backcountry ski journey. At day's end find the warmth of friends and good cheer by your Log House fireplace. Check the website http://www.garnet-hill.com/ for more info.

Bryce Canyon, UT—*March 6-11, 2007: Contact Rob Swennes*—Bryce Canyon is another possible late winter destination for skiing on the Colorado plateau at elevations of 8,000 to 10,000 feet. One night in Las Vegas, NV. The cost of the trip would be about \$300, plus air fare and food. Where else can you get premier skiing conditions (and the locals' Western twang) with a daily price for lodging and local transportation of only \$60/day?

Elk River, WV—TBD—The Elk River Touring Center is located five miles from Snowshoe Mountain Resort at elevation 2750', high enough to receive an annual snowfall of about 180 inches per year. Cross-country skiing trails which criss-cross the Highland Scenic Highway, which peaks at an elevation of around 4700'. The downhill skiing at nearby Snowshoe Mountain peaks at 4848' mak-
