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CROSS COUNTRY SKIING IN ESTONIA

If you asked an ordinary person on a street of Washington DC, New York or Boston a question about skiing, it's pretty safe to say that the person would assume that the question relates to downhill or Alpine skiing. However, if you would ask the same question on a street of the capital city of Tallinn or any other city in Estonia, that person would, with great certainty, assume that the question relates to cross-country skiing. This is because XC skiing is traditionally the most popular winter sport in Estonia; it is also a part of the Estonian culture in the winter.

When the winter season starts and snow covers most of the country (which sometimes happens in November), you can see the XC skiers everywhere - at the ski resorts.

city suburbs, parks and rural areas. Usually, a ski season in Estonia starts in December and lasts until the end of March. However, some XC ski resorts make snow and the ski season may be extended well into April. In Estonia XC skiing is a national sport and truly for everyone, men, woman and children of all ages young and old. In a grade school, XC skiing is part of a physical education class curriculum during the winter months. During the winter season many XC ski competitions are held throughout the country.

The most popular and well known is the Tartu Ski Marathon established in 1960, which now attracts professional and amateur skiers around the world. More than 8,500 skiers participated in the Tartu 42nd

Nordic skiers are ever optimists. Once the weather turns chilly (as it has now in the Washington metropolitan area), we expect that each week will deliver a good layering of snow so that we can strap on the x-country skis that have been waiting so patiently in the corner or closet for this morning to arrive. Of course, the actual weather conditions do not always meet our desires, but they will . . . in time.

There have already been several large wintry blasts down from the Arctic that have chilled communities well into California and the Deep South. Snow is on the ground in Yellowstone, where a group of us will be in a couple months' time. If you want to see Old Faithful in real time with surrounding snow, go to the video web cam recording at http://www.nps.gov/features/yell/live/live4.htm. Maybe you will catch the geyser erupting.

In Highland Forest State Park south of Syracuse, seven inches of powdery snow has fallen since late November. Osceola Tug Hill Ski Touring Center (STC) northeast of Syracuse has already received 14 inches of snow thus far (http://www.uxcski.com/) as of the day I write

this. More is expected this coming weekend. That is good news for those signed up thus far for Peggy and Steve's annual trip to the Tug Hill region around New Years (see the STS Trip Schedule in this issue and in more detail on the STS web site). The folks at the Jackson STC in New Hampshire (http://

www.jacksonxc.org/) are expecting a winter storm to hit December 9th and to be open for business thereafter. The Great Glen STC up in Pinkham Notch, NH expects to open December 7th on a limited basis, but the predicted storm a couple of days later should expand the number of skiable trails.

White Grass STC in Canaan Valley, WV (http://www.whitegrass.com/), our most local Nordic skiing center here in the mid-Atlantic region, has no skiable snow at the moment, but remains ever hopeful and vigilant, awaiting the snow storms to come. As Chip writes on December 5th: "Excitement builds at the wg clubhouse not knowin' when the snow will come...positive thoughts toward the great unknown. Ullr sacrifices will open the heavens this weekend." Optimists all.



If you are serious about your cross-country skiing, you should be the same. Don't mope about depressed wondering whether snow will ever arrive. What you should be concerned about is whether there will be any space left on our Ski Touring Section trips when the snow arrives. And you can address that real concern by signing up now for the trips of your choice -- among those that are still available.

Reservations will close soon on several of the Section's excursion trips planned for this winter. Those trip leaders can't wait around for you to make a decision only weeks before the trips launch. There are nonrefundable lodging deposits that must be paid one or more months in advance. Act now!

marathon this year including the Estonian Prime Minister Andrus Ansip. A short video of this year's marathon can be seen here.

In recent years Estonian professional XC skiers have won medals at the Olympics, Nordic skiing World Championships and World Cup races. The most famous and successful Estonian XC skiers are Andrus Veerpalu and Kristina Smigun-Vähi, each with two Olympic gold and one silver medal). Estonia offers ample opportunities for XC skiing with many ski resorts throughout the country. Some of the best ski resorts are located in the

south western part of Estonia near the town of Otepää (226 km/140 miles, some 3 hours drive from Tallinn) and beautiful Lake Pühajärve (which means Holy Lake). Otepää (population about 2,200) is called the "Winter Capital" of Estonia and has been internationally renowned for years. Otepää got its name, which in Estonian slang means "bear's head" after the shape of the castle hill - which reminds you of a bear's head. It has the most popular winter sports resorts not only in Estonia but in the entire Baltic Sea region and offers ideal conditions for cross-country skiers. The area's most popular ski resort, Kääriku Leisure and Sports Centre is located some 13 km (8 miles) south of Otepää and has a famous Kekkonen trail (named after the Finish president Urho K. Kekkonen who visited Kääriku and skied there in 1964). That trail is 15 km of well groomed tracks (both classical and free style). About 3 km (1.8 miles) of these ski tracks are lighted for night skiing. The famous Tartu Marathon 63 km (39.15 miles) trail runs from the Tehvandi stadium to the town of Elva near the university city of Tartu. There is also about 12 km (7.4 miles) of track (classic and free style) from Pühajärve Lake Spa Hotel to the Kääriku ski center of which the last 3km (1.8 miles) from Sihva to Kääriku is lighted at night. The shorter 2 km (1.2 miles), 5 km (3.1 miles) and 15 km (9.3 miles) groomed tracks are also located in that resort. Another XC ski resort in the area is the Tehvandi Sport Center with several trails from 2 km to 10 km including the 3.75

First Skiers



Ever wonder how people got the idea to strap boards on their feet and slide down hills? Jonas Bendickson, a photographer with National Geographic, traveled to the Altay Mountains of Siberia and tracked down some traditional winter hunters called the Tuvan who use wooden skis with horse or elk hide nailed and glued to the bottom to pursue elk in the deep snow of their winters.

Like Snowshoe Thompson of Sierra Nevada fame, these folks use one long pole (called a *taiyak*), sometimes with paddle shaped blades on the ends, instead of our two poles. The video on the site shows the Tuvan skiers holding this pole out behind them and steering like a rudder as they go down steep hills leaning way back on the skis.

Ancient petroglyphs in the area show that these methods have been used for thousands of years, and remain essentially unchanged. Unfortunately, the younger generation doesn't seem to be interested in skiing uphill—just like our kids.

Get the December 2013 issue of the National Geographic magazine, or view the features of this article online here. You must log in (free account) to see everything on this story. Doug Lesar comments that the Tuvan people of Asia are well known for "throat singing". Another connection to skiing, as if you've ever heard Chip Chase singing away while driving an ATV, groomer, or truck at White Grass, you might mistake him for a Tuvan throat singer.

Battling Winter Forecasts

Doug Lesar noted that the White Grass Report had contradictions between the two forecast maps on the left and right and the middle map of another forecasting origin. The first two are from AccuWeather (http://www.accuweather.com/en/weather-news/us-winter-2013-2014-snow/18574742) and depict "winter" and deviations from normal snowfall, with most of WV and southern PA being BELOW average snowfall.





A more optimistic report is from Weather Advance (http://weatheradvance.com/preliminary-winter-2013-2014-winter-outlook/), which says: "Look For Pattern Of Late Last Winter To Pick up where it left off, starting early winter. Winter Will get off to a fast start. January Thaw Will Come But Will Not be as bad as 2011-2012 winter. Weak La Nina Seems slightly favorable for upcoming winter. Weak La Nina's Favor More Snow in The Mid-Atlantic. Worst Of Winter Will be North And West Of I-95.

I know what I'm betting on, but all forecasts are accurate—until the snow flies.

km (2.3 miles) classical and 3.75 km free style track. Both of these tracks are lighted and open daily until 9 pm. There are also 2 km (1.4 miles) and 2.5 km (1.6 miles) of lighted race tracks and a 10 km (6.2 miles) hiking trail available for backcountry skiers.

The best downhill slopes (in otherwise flat Estonian landscape) are also located in the Otepää / Kääriku region. The longest run in Otepää (450 m/1,476 ft.) is called Vaike-Munamägi and another downhill resort near Otepää is Ansomagi with 5 lighted smaller slopes. During every winter season a number of Nordic ski events, including the World Cup Cross Country stages are held in the Otepää/ Kääriku region. Otepää is one of the locations in Estonia where you can always find snow during the winter season since Otepää is located up-country and far from the sea. The last two winters have been generous with abundant snow in Otepää and in Estonia. If you are tired after a long day and night skiing, there are plenty of opportunities to relax in and around Otepää. You could visit a ski museum, the Sangaste 19-th century castle, Estonian Flag museum or just relax at the Pühajärve SPA or other nearby spas with saunas, hot tubs, and swimming pools and other amenities. At

night, Otepää area offers several restaurants, pubs, cafeterias and nightclubs with live music on weekends.



Another good place for XC skiing is a Jõulumäe Recreation Center resort near the town of Pärnu (118 km/73 miles, 1.5 hours drive from Tallinn). The Recreation Center has 15 different ski trails (classical and free style tracks) ranging from 1 km (0,6 miles) to 15 km (9.3 miles) including 1,2 km (0.7 miles) and 2,3 km (1.4 miles) of lighted tracks. The snow conditions at the Jõulumäe ski resort are usually good and as in Otepää, they are able to make snow if it becomes necessary. There are plenty of opportunities for XC skiing near and around Tallinn. The suburbs such as Pirita and Nomme both have well prepared and well-lit, professional standard tracks (classical and free style) and slopes for beginners as well as advanced skiers. An advantage of skiing near Tallinn is an opportunity to do some sightseeing in the old town, a beautiful, and one of the best preserved, medieval old towns in Europe. Its hilly cobblestone streets include a fortress, museums, several large churches and many shops, restaurants and pubs - all of this in a walking distance within the ancient walls of a medieval fortress. Last, but not least, all of the XC ski resorts in Estonia offer full equipment rental with reasonable prices.

Your Guide to Nordic Conditions Throughout the U.S. and Canada




